A public, intentional, explicit welcome for diverse gender identities and sexual orientations.


The process is spiritual; reflective; contextual; educational; fully participatory.

Encountering the Need

A need, question, or vision leads a ministry to ask how it can be publicly, intentionally, and explicitly welcoming.

Documenting

Before a final decision is made, an inclusive marriage policy, Vision Statement, Action Plan for the future, and more must be created.
